

SMALL FURRY PET STATS



Searching for the ideal first pet for your child? Check out our stats for six different small furry pets to help you understand some of what it will entail.



Different types: 60+ recognised breeds including large, dwarf, and long-haired

Lifespan: Average 5 to 12 years - small breeds tend to live longer than large ones

Nocturnal or Diurnal: Neither. They are crepuscular, meaning that they are most active at dusk and dawn.

Hibernate: Rabbits do NOT hibernate





Different types: 40+ recognised breeds, common: American Cavy, Abyssinian, Teddy

Lifespan: Average 4 to 8 years

Nocturnal or Diurnal: Neither. They are crepuscular, meaning that they are most active at dusk and dawn. They take short naps instead of sleeping for a long time

Hibernate: Guinea Pigs do NOT hibernate

Hamsters

Different types: 24 breeds, common ones: Gerbils
Syrian, Russian Durant C

Lifespan: Average 2 to 3 years

Nocturnal or Diurnal: Nocturnal

Hibernate: Hamsters typically WILL hibernate for a short period if the temperature inside your home is colder than 10 degrees Celsius for a few davs in a row



Different types: 87 known species but only two kept as pets: Mongolian & Flat Tailed

Lifespan: Average 3 to 4 years or longer

Nocturnal or Diurnal: Diurnal, meaning they are active during the day

Hibernate: Gerbils do NOT need to hibernate but may go into a lethargic state if exposed to cold temperatures for too long



Different types: 7 recognised types of 'Fancy Rat (bred to be pets): Bristle Coat, Dumbo, Hairless, Rex, Satin, Standard, Tailless, and Dwarf - 40 recognised Rat Sections (coat colours & patterns)

Lifespan: Average 2 to 3 years

Nocturnal or Diurnal: Primarily nocturnal

Hibernate: Pet rats do NOT hibernate but do stock up on food for the winter

Mice

Different types: 'Fancy Mice' (bred to be pets) are relations of common house mice and come in different colours & coat types including Hairless. Astrex, Satin, Longhair, and Shorthair

Lifespan: Average 1 to 2 years

Nocturnal or Diurnal: Primarily nocturnal

Hibernate: Pet mice do NOT hibernate but can sleep for long periods during the day
